



In 2022, the world was still reeling from the effects of a pandemic that seemed here to stay, and the impacts of which were superposed to the already grim picture painted by the climate crisis and the increasing number of challenges to universal values and rights.

More than ever in these turbulent times, Forus remained committed to its vision of a world where civil society organizations can effectively participate in decision-making processes and contribute to sustainable development. We adapted our strategies and found innovative ways to continue our work, leveraging online platforms and amplifying the work of Forus members to ensure that our voices were heard.

None of these accomplishments you will read in the following pages would have been possible without the extremely hard work and dedication of our members and partners, who have remained committed to our shared vision despite the challenges we faced.

Just to mention a few: the monster monsoon in Pakistan, political polarisation across Latin America, conflict and consecutive Ebola outbreaks in the Democratic Republic of Congo, the war in Ukraine and in the Sahel which has resulted in widespread displacement and food insecurity, persistent drought and extreme weather, and the ongoing impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. We are grateful to the network for their tireless efforts and unwavering commitment to the values that we stand for.

We know this hasn't been easy as unfortunately, 2022 was also a year that saw numerous attacks on civil society organizations and activists around the world. These attacks took many forms, including legal and administrative restrictions, physical violence, and online harassment. Forus believes it is imperative that we continue to stand up for civil society and defend their right to operate freely and safely.

This is why in 2022 we increased the opportunities to share, discuss, strategize and learn with and from each other.

For civil society platforms, confronted to different realities, yet oftentimes similar challenges, it is essential to “think together” and share the difficulties they are facing at national and regional level, but also and foremost to celebrate their strength, their achievements, and the innovative practices they have put in place to continue their work.

In 2022, Forus launched a new cycle of capacity development support to members. Our member-led approach ensures that our network is truly responsive to the needs faced by platforms in their respective contexts and, by supporting local leadership, we are able to tap into the unique strengths and expertise of our network and ensure that our work is grounded in local realities.

As a global network, we also continued to expand our advocacy work.

We pushed for more equitable and sustainable policies, for more participation of civil society and for more accountability of those in power. From our involvement in the Finance in Common process to the Tech for Democracy initiative, we called for new paradigms that are slowly taking shape with the voices of civil society. We also launched several initiatives and projects to promote civic space - both online and offline - and strengthen the role of civil society in democratic processes.

We have advocated for the rights of women through the #MarchWithUs campaign and have raised awareness about issues such as digital rights with #Let'sTalkDigital and the participation of civil society in decision-making processes with #UNmute.

We have looked outside but also within the network.

We have worked hard on giving more depth to how we practice accountability. We have developed a comprehensive feedback system for Forus members, and we continue to integrate their suggestions into every aspect of the network. We have reviewed the ways we use language, and we communicate. We have continued to tell our stories of positive change through our #Alternative Narratives campaign. Again, this wouldn't have been possible without the inspiration and testimonies from members and other activists.

As Angela Davis said in a rainy afternoon in Belgium, "Our differences could be the glue that holds us together". We need to leave open the door for debate, for exchanges, for different tactics, and this is exactly what the Forus network does. One of the greatest strengths of our network is our diversity. We come from different backgrounds, cultures, and experiences, yet we are united by a shared vision.

Over the past year, our network has reached new horizons in Pakistan and Mexico. Forus members as well as their own members have, as always, deployed great efforts to reach those who are often disregarded by other actors. From providing support to refugees and displaced persons from the conflict in Ukraine, to advocating for the rights of women and the youth and the creation of a healthy cooperation, to promoting environmental sustainability and combating climate change across South Asia, our network has been at the forefront of important issues facing our world today. By working together, despite and because of our differences, we can multiply our impact and achieve greater change than we could on our own.

As we look ahead to the future, we are excited about the possibilities that lie ahead. We remain committed to our mission of promoting a more just and sustainable world, and we are confident that, together, we can make a positive difference in the lives of millions of people around the world.







OUR GLOBAL REACH

Forus is the primary international network exclusively federating national and regional CSO networks. With 68 national platforms and 7 regional coalitions, overwhelmingly rooted in the global south, Forus establishes powerful connections reuniting CSOs in 124 countries.

Linking together over 22.000 CSOs around the world, Forus is a powerful actor in global governance fora. Forus members also play key roles at the local level.

83% of Forus members report that their members provide services and support to their local communities. **84%** of Forus members also report that their members are regularly involved in awareness-raising and public information activities, as well as advocacy activities and campaigns.

Forus brings together:

- 24 national platforms from North and Sub-Saharan Africa
- 11 national platforms from Asia
- 15 national platforms from Europe
- 12 national platforms from Latin America
- 2 national platforms from North America
- 4 national platforms from the Pacific
- 7 regional coalitions from Asia, the Pacific Islands, Western, Central & South Africa, Latin America & Europe are also part of the network.

OUR STORY AND MISSION:

We aim at enhancing inclusive and participative civic actions to contribute to social justice everywhere.

While other time-bound or thematic initiatives already existed, CSO networks initiated Forus in 2008 to create a safe and durable space for CSO networks to strategize with peers on shared challenges, connect projects and messages and amplify civil society voices at a global level.

Since its creation, Forus has effectively supported the work of its members and fostered the emergence of new CSO structures through its work on enabling environments and as a catalyzer of peer learning.

SOME HIGHLIGHTS

Participative campaigns such as #Unmute (or #UNmute) which started during the High-Level Political Forum in 2020 to raise awareness of the need of expanding - rather than shrinking - the space for civil society. Today, the recommendations prepared by the Permanent Mission of Denmark, the Permanent Mission of Costa Rica, UN Foundation, CIVICUS, Action for Sustainable Development, Global Focus, Action Aid International and Forus as part of the campaign, have been endorsed by 52 member states and 334 civil society members.

The promotion of an enabling environment for civil society organisations - both online and offline - through initiatives such as Tech for Democracy, the OECD Civil Society Organisations Working Group developing the new Recommendations on an Enabling Environment and more.

The creation of a Leadership Development program to develop entrepreneurial and visionary individuals of the next generation who will ultimately change the way in which CSO networks function in the future.

Solidarity grants to national platforms during the Covid-19 pandemic which helped national platforms to continue and adapt their operations and offer essential services.





WE STRENGTHEN CIVIL SOCIETY BY:

- **Connecting** national and regional platforms to build common actions, learn from each other and fight for an enabling environment for civil society organizations.
- **Supporting** and developing the capacities of its members for more effective participation in the decision-making processes, using collective intelligence from the network and innovative approaches.
- **Influencing** public policies with our members, by engaging with decision-makers at national, regional and international levels, publishing evidence-based reports and developing joint advocacy strategies and messages.




2 IN 2022, FORUS WELCOMED 2 NEW MEMBERS: THE PAKISTAN DEVELOPMENT ALLIANCE (PDA) AND UNIDOSC (MEXICO).

In 2022, two new members have joined the Forus network: [the Pakistan Development Alliance \(PDA\)](#) and [UnidOSC \(Mexico\)](#). UnidOSC is a coalition comprised of civil society organisations, foundations, academics and activists interested in protecting the operational space for civil society through proactive strategic proposals designed to advance the sector, and diverse responses to new risks and challenges that arise. The coalition has provided an identity for the collective effort to defend and champion civic space in Mexico and in the region. The Pakistan Development Alliance (PDA) has carved out its own distinct identity in the development sector in Pakistan. PDA grows out of developmental and rights-based programs and campaigns run by various NGOs and networks on governance, accountability, civil and political rights, gender equality and the SDGs.



#A Space for Us podcasts & videos: sharing voices on human rights, digitalisation, climate justice, gender equality and more

Launched in 2020, the “A Space for Us” podcast features activists, civil society organisations and social movements from across the globe. Civic space challenges in Mexico, transparency and accountability in Nigeria, gender justice in South Asia, using Artificial Intelligence to decolonise language and much more: this year, Forus has published a dozen new episodes of A Space for Us series featuring inspiring stories from 14 Forus members & 7 activists, including Angela Davis on collaborative practices, Alice Nkom fighting for LGBTQ rights in Cameroon, Chihiro Geuzebroek on climate justice, Caryn Dasah on women’s rights and Sobhi Khatib on technology, Artificial Intelligence and the metaverse. In December 2022 Forus launched the “A Space for Us” video series with the documentary “Until it Shines” on the work of human rights defender and Barrister Alice Nkom fighting for the LGBTQ+ community in Cameroon.

5 On the need for Alternative Narratives

Forus is leading a [global campaign on alternative narratives](#). One of the main reasons why civil society activists are starting to build alternative narratives is because of the growing realisation that the dominant narratives are undermining activism. The dissemination of these increasingly dominant and negative narratives, targeted especially at human rights and gender activists, as well as environmental defenders, is used by different groups to keep certain ideas or sets of existing power relations in place. In 2022, the #AlternativeNarratives campaign shared initiatives from Forus members fighting for human rights to be upheld, such as Unitas in Bolivia and PFNOSCM in Madagascar, on decolonising language with Bond in the UK and the Uganda National NGO Forum and on questioning "who owns narratives" with Platong in Cape Verde. Building on this, Forus launched the "Enabling Stories" report, co-written with over 15 members, in July 2022. With the #AlternativeNarratives campaign we hope to trigger debate and bring to the forefront innovative storytelling and creative examples from within and beyond the network.



7 Supporting our national members through capacity development projects

Between 2017 and 2022, Forus has partnered with and supported national members for 62 capacity development projects. 4 of them took place in consortium, since Forus members are encouraged to develop joint initiatives to strengthen links and synergies between them, as well as promoting mutual learning. There are currently 13 projects being supported by Forus in the framework of its capacity development activities. The objective? Designing practical capacity development projects elaborated by Forus members themselves and aligned with their local context and specific needs. Forus' capacity development approach is horizontal and one of its fundamentals is the creation of knowledge by its members. Our approach to the need for continuous capacity development is impact-oriented, needs-based and uses a peer-to-peer approach, promoting expertise and innovation, reflection and the exchange of best practice amongst its members at the national, regional and global levels.

Aiming to create a space of exchange among regional members, Forus organized several meetings between all regional coalitions in 2022. The first meeting focused on an enabling environment, (find out more on our website in [English](#), [French](#) and [Spanish](#)). The second meeting was an opportunity for all to share their respective priorities and look for synergies. Regional coalitions REPAOC and REPONGAC for instance organized a joint workshop in October in Togo to decide on collective strategies related to the recommendations of a recent Forus study on the dynamics of civil society in Africa. The third meeting focused on transparency and accountability, which included presentations from Mesa,ADA and PIANGO on their accountability initiatives. The latter has the long-term goal to define Accountability in Pacific terms, creating an Institutional Assessment and Mapping (IAM) that considers not only the internal processes of a CSO but also the external environment in which it operates, looking to develop a common language and tools and to build trust with stakeholders of PIANGO and its members.


9 Leveraging SDG 17 and CSO Capacity Development to accelerate SDG Implementation

In 2022, Forus published a policy brief called “Leveraging SDG 17 and CSO Capacity Development to accelerate SDG Implementation”, available in [English](#), [French](#) and [Spanish](#) and launched at the High-Level Political Forum. Its purpose was to highlight the actions, or the inaction of governments in relation to ensuring the capacity building of civil society for SDG monitoring & implementation, especially that of CSOs from the Global South who are historically underfunded. The preparations for the report to be launched at the UN HLPF in July 2023 have already started, with the Advisory Group comprising of 14 Forus members. In the 2023 report, we will focus on a range of topics which are redefining civil society worldwide, including power shift, localization and decolonization.


11 Empowering Members Through Feedback: A Network's Path to Success!





Support to Forus members facing human rights and civic space restrictions

From Mozambique to Chad and Brazil, the Forus network mobilised for members dealing with human rights abuses and civic space restrictions across the globe. Forus raised awareness and advocated for policy changes and international pressure with its members. Additionally, Forus provided opportunities for training, and other forms of capacity development and support to help its members better navigate the challenges they face and increase their ability to protect rights in their communities. Ultimately, Forus believes in sustained support, solidarity and collaboration to help create a stronger and more resilient civil society that can stand up against human rights abuses and work towards a more just and equitable future.

The internet survey that's helping to accelerate digital equity

As part of its mission to promote a digital enabling environment for civil society, Forus has partnered with Connect Humanity, CIVICUS, WINGS, nten, and Techsoup on the largest ever survey on digital equity. Based on survey responses from 7500+ participants across 136 countries, Connect Humanity developed the State of Digital Inequity report which provides the largest ever mapping of the digital barriers facing civil society organizations — and those faced by the communities they serve. As stated in the report, while 95 percent of organizations said the internet is vital to their ability to do their work, three in four said that a lack of internet access, tools, or skills limits their ability to serve their communities effectively. Just 12 percent of practitioners said they 'strongly agree' that the communities they serve have internet connectivity. When asked to identify their top three technology challenges, 39 percent of participants pointed to slow speeds and 32 percent to unreliable internet.

Forus calls for an enabling digital environment for civil society

Forus has actively engaged in advocacy efforts to ensure that civil society has the necessary digital tools, resources, and skills. Through a series of articles, reports and podcasts episodes, Forus has raised awareness about the risks and challenges that civil society and activists face in the digital space, ranging from surveillance Mexico and censorship in Nigeria, to online harassment in Pakistan and Peru. By providing guidance, resources, and capacity-development support, Forus has supported its members to navigate the complex landscape of digital rights. Forus has also partnered with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Denmark as part of the [#TechforDemocracy](#) initiative and the [#CopenhagenPledge](#) for a just, equal and rights-based digital world and contributes to shaping policies and practices that protect and promote civil society's rights in the digital world by participating in internet governance fora.

The 2022 High-Level Political Forum (UN HLPF) took place in July, gathering government representatives, international institutions and civil society actors from all over the world. During the 2022 HLPF, Forus co-organized three side events on alternative narratives to counter the criminalization of civil society, digitalization and civic space, and on leveraging SDG 17 to strengthen and improve the Voluntary National Review process. Forus side events gathered more than 450 participants and featured the participation of 11 Forus members as panelists, along with 12 external partners.

17 It's about Global Justice: highlights from the Global People's Assembly

In this shadow event to the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), from Afghanistan to Brazil, powerful testimonies were given about the current state of injustices and conflicts around the globe.

3rd Finance in Common summit

In October 2022, Forus' Chair, Christelle Kalhoule, and representatives from five Forus members (Abong, ADA, CCONG, NNNGO, REPAOC) participated in the Finance in Common Summit (FICS), in Abidjan. Forus is currently chairing the FICS informal CSO mechanism and was responsible for the coordination of the group engagement at the Summit, which included a Joint Civil Society Statement signed by over 50 organisations, released in English, Spanish, French and Arabic.

In December 2022, Forus Chair Christelle Kalhoule discussed the findings of a recently released report by the French Development Agency on the intersection of human rights and development. 

INCOME IN 2022

In 2022, Forus was able to keep up with all main activities for the network thanks to the support of the French Development Agency (€840,611), the main public donor, and Fondation de France (€115,000). The Monaco Cooperation Agency also maintained its support (€10,000). Membership fees from Forus members (over €36,000) provided significant support in 2022. Finally, in the framework of projects implemented by members with the financial support of Forus, co-financing (up to approximately €10,000) was identified by the platforms that received this support in 2022.

2022 Revenues




EXPENSES IN 2022

In 2022, staff costs (€399,776) represented the second largest area of expenditure, as other Forus activity costs have been restricted by a low level of resources. The use of external contractors and experts (€ 84,964) or interpreters and translators (€18,207) was limited; overhead costs were also incurred with caution (€37,414). The reactivation of face-to-face meetings came late, resulting in a still reduced level of travel expenses (€33,867). In 2022, Forus organised a cycle of financial support for national and regional projects based on activities proposed by members, and also partnered with members and other stakeholders on a new project focusing on dialogue with public development banks; all of this subgranting activity amounted to €421,861 in 2022, which represents Forus' largest area of expenditure.

The positive result (+ €12,424) for the financial year 2022 is linked to non-earmarked income (such as membership fees) and savings in secretariat overheads.
